BCOT meeting

The BCA periodically have liaison meetings with BCOT. We felt you may benefit from the following information:

BCOT's car park is going to be used by the council during the Christmas period. All traffic and pedestrians are being directed along Worting Road.

Thomas Cook have an office in the north building of BCOT offering all the facilities of a travel shop (not sure about currency). It is open to the public during the week, Monday to Thursday from 9.30am to 7pm and on Fridays between 9.30am and 5.30pm. Victory Flooding

The roundabout continues to be a problem for pedestrians walking to and from Town. It has also been exacerbated by the current heavy rain.

A meeting with BDBC was arranged. Unfortunately, owing to illness, Tony Curtis (Planning and Transportation) was unable to attend. However, Roger Archer-Reeves (Head of Traffic and Construction) was on hand to answer our questions.

The B.C.A strongly expressed their disgust at the length of time it is taking to resolve the problem of the Victory Roundabout subway, its gradient and the lack of consultation with local parties.

It was pointed out to Mr Archer-Reeves that the existing gradient was far too steep and the subway was often flooded. Several previous meetings had been held and the B.C.A. had been assured that the problem would be put right.

He outlined the problems associated with the water table. He said that the present pumps could only deal with surface water, there is no system to deal with the ground water and this problem is going to be very expensive to rectify. To level the gradients would

cost in the region of half a million pounds. Services such as gas and BT would have to be moved.

Pam Mansfield said that she'd actually seen a lady fall out of her wheelchair because of the steepness of the subway. Jane Griggs pointed out that there had been no alternative way allowed to cross the road.

Mr Archer-Reeves said that the money for road works did not come from public money but from the developers.

Roger Blackmore-Squires of the BCA reminded Mr Archer-Reeves that similar complaints had been made back in 1977 and it had been agreed that it would be dealt with.

Mr Archer-Reeves said that an engineer had been commissioned and that when he got the Cabinet report and a decision had been made, he would consult the BCA. He added that new council Cabinet had already assured that all meeting would be public.

The BCA reiterated the point that we want to be involved and that we need this problem solved in months, not years. Mr Archer-Reeves invited the BCA to write to him about our concerns. He said that he would act as a liaison between the BCA and the council.

PLEASE REMEMBER to call the Council on 845334 when you find the subway impossible to use thus proving to the council that this is a real problem. Timberlake Road is not safe to cross and we do not want this situation to drag on any longer than necessary.

A message from your local councillor


Concern has been expressed about the new road layout at the junction of Deep Lane and Lower Brook Street at the entrance to Millennium Court.


